Age Friendly ROSCREA

As 2021 draws to a close, we are delighted with this opportunity to send good wishes and sincerely thank everyone who has been part of the Age Friendly Roscrea story over the past year. A year where the changing COVID profile meant plans often had to be adapted, curtailed or cancelled.

Our choir, the Rosie Greys. Courthouse activities and classes continued when possible. In October Ukulele classes with Fionan Stapleton started, and hopefully a seedling Ukulele group. Classes planned for the New Year are, crafts, art, computers, yarn spinning and scribbling and chair yoga.

Christmas Dinner: This year Age Friendly Roscrea will deliver dinners on Christmas Day, this is part of a North Tipperary Initiative. There is no charge and early booking is advised. 0505 22550 for information and booking.

The regular Dinner Delivery service, started during COVID continues to run successfully and meals are delivered Monday, Wednesday and Friday- with a meal charge of €5

The Acorn Project continues. Acorns are known as age friendly digital devices! They can have mobile data which means an internet connection isn't necessary. There is no charge for use of the device, but there is a weekly charge of €5 to cover the cost of the mobile data and Acorn support. Classes and one to one support will recommence after Christmas. There is a limited number of devices available.

Our Befriending service continues with limitations and Senior Alert Scheme is available

Roscrea Digest Volume 2 will be published in time for Xmas. Again this will be a miscellany of stories, social history,





poetry, reflections and memories. A Corona Legacy. We are privileged to include in this issue a catalogue of the prolific writings of George Cunningham. George's contribution to our Roscrea Community is immeasurable and invaluable. He himself is a living archive, but his published legacy will endure and inform generations. As Tom and Lucy Stapleton make plans for their next life chapter, we also wish to honour and acknowledge their unique contribution over many years. The list of 'gigs' they organised is phenomenal and reading through it will evoke memories of many magical music events we were so lucky to have on our own doorsteps.

Dementia Project. Dementia has and will touch, to some degree, all our lives. Being dementia aware and informed is the first step in ensuring that the supports, treatments and the environment are what the person with dementia and their family needs and wants. Making this happen is a key focus for Age Friendly Roscrea.

Some of AFR dementia initiatives:

Roscrea Dementia Café meets 4th Friday each month in the Courthouse. An informal and relaxed get-together for people with dementia, their carers and friends. They are joined by a number of service providers including the newly appointed Dementia Advisor for North Tipperary for chat and a cuppa. There is a guest speaker at each event.

Creating a more dementia friendly environment and public Realm

Tipperary LCDC are the lead partner on a Healthy Ireland funded action to promote Dementia Awareness in Tipperary, as part of this action Roscrea, as the named Age Friendly town for Tipperary, a walkability audit undertaken by DDS Architects. This survey took place on 1st and 2nd September with the final

report to be available to view and comment on December 1st however the planned information event had to be postponed with the changing COVID profile and is now planned for very early in the New Year. The report is enlightening, practical and makes very interesting reading and will underpin and support many future projects. Local Businesses will be invited to be part of the project and expand on the initiatives they undertook in the previous age friendly business programme

For close on 50 years the 'Deano' has been part of our community, not merely part of it but in fact the beating heart and personality of the community. We feel safe when we know 'the Deano' is there. Of course we would prefer to stay at home until the Almighty calls us but should we need care then we want the reassurance of knowing our golden days can be lived in the heart of our community. We are very fortunate in Roscrea to have 3 other excellent residential care centres but best practice dictates that that there should be a private /public funded residential care mix. When this is lost situations such as is happening in Britain develop, and private commercial monopolies dominate.

How a person makes the decision and how they transfer to residential care affects their well being for the rest of their days. For the members of the 'Deano' who start with a day in the day unit and build their care relationship up graciously with respite, and maybe eventually full time care, it is a seamless controlled experience. Mutual Community Relationships and contacts are maintained throughout.

The decision to transplant 25 of Roscrea 'beds' to Nenagh is folly in the extreme at a time when we should be building capacity and supports, the opposite is happening. I am reminded of a parable from a different culture

The mother of a large family dies in childbirth. The husband is distraught, who will take care of his children, his animals and clean his house. The solution is to get a new wife, an ugly one will do fine, easier to get. He gets the new wife, she even has a few more children for him. After a while money is tight and the husband is looking for new ways to earn some. He sees an advertisement in the paper. Sell a kidney and earn €1000. Brilliant, of course he doesn't sell his own kidney he sells the wife's. She recovers quickly and is back to work straight away. After a while, the money is gone, well it was a good solution the last time, so he sells her other kidney!!

Roscrea Cares CLG trading as Age Friendly Roscrea have submitted a proposal to the Department of Health. This proposal built on the previous proposal by RCDC and Tipperary LA. There are now plans to further progress this proposal. However, the silence from the Department and the Health Service Executive is deafening. Roscrea must have action.

I am calling for the period 2nd February 2022 to 22nd February to be Dean Maxwell Time when a concerted campaign is put in place by all Roscrea Citizens and relevant stakeholders. A united front with no other agenda except the insistence on a comprehensive, integrated quality service

that is needed and deserved by older Roscrea citizens. I look forward to your participation and contribution

Age Friendly Roscrea receives wonderful support and encouragement from many individuals, organisations and government agencies, of course we will always be on the lookout for more. For this organisation to be sustainable into the future, it is essential that there is guaranteed core funding to support the appointment of a project co-ordinator with administrative support. This is a critical time for us. The organisation has demonstrated that Roscrea needs and benefits from the services we provide. It would be such a loss to our community if Age Friendly isn't facilitated to continue and expand.



Latest News From Ascend NTDC:

Ascend Domestic Abuse Service for Women & Cuan Saor Women's Refuge & Support Services Clg (South Tipperary) come together to raise awareness of Domestic Violence Supports across the County.

Cuan Saor and Ascend Domestic Abuse Service are marking the 16 days of Activism of Violence Against Women by launching a joint all-county awareness raising initiative 'One Million Stars Project'

The 16 days of Activism of Violence Against Women is a Global Campaign opposing violence against women and runs from 25th November (which is UN Day opposing Violence Against Women) to the 10th December (which is Human rights Day). In Ireland domestic violence services across the Country actively support the campaign.

One Million Stars: The Story

The One Million Stars to End Violence Project was established by Maryann Talia Pau, a Samoan-Australian artist, in response to the rape and murder of an Irish Woman in Melbourne Australia. In Samoan culture, the star is a symbol of light, hope and solidarity. The project used star weaving to rebuild trust within the community. In 2020 Siobhan McQuillan working with Amber Women's Refuge, brought the project to Kilkenny. Since then, it has been extended to many counties and in 2021

both Ascend and Cuan Saor felt it was a project that would raise awareness of both services in Co. Tipperary ensuring that women who are experiencing domestic violence are fully aware that there is help within their community. Kathleen Maher in Ascend and Verona Nugent in Cuan Saor have been busy over the past few months distributing packs to groups and schools in preparation for the launch of the project to coincide with the 16 days of activism campaign on 25th November. Geraldine Mullane Project Leader of Cuan Saor said that "Secondary Schools across the county have embraced the project with great energy and are coming up with creative ideas on how to display the stars on the 8th March 2022 (International Women's Day)" Kathleen Maher in Ascend said "Both organisations have enlisted support from a number of different agencies across the county such as Healthy Ireland and SICAP (Social Inclusion Community Activation Programme, which is part of the North Tipperary Development Company, NTDC.)" Verona Nugent said, "The Project has connected the Community through Art while raising Domestic Abuse awareness and using the power of weaving and art to build community resilience and hope for a safer future for all".

Visit to Roscrea of Frank Feighan, T.D., Minister of State with responsibility for Public Health, Well Being and National Drugs Strategy

Tipperary County Council and Tipperary Children and Young Person's Committee (CYPSC) welcomed Frank Feighan, T.D., Minister of State with responsibility for Public Health, Well Being and National Drugs Strategy to Roscrea on Monday September 27 where he viewed examples of Healthy Ireland funded activity ongoing in the county.

Minister Feighan firstly visited Willison Pre School, Monastery Road, Roscrea, where the Wibbly Wobbly Bike programme is currently being actioned. This programme aims to train early years providers in the use of balance bikes and thus facilitate toddlers to cycle. Each early year's service will receive training and will have use the balance bikes over a six-week period.

Minister Feighan then met with Roscrea Age Friendly who are taking part in the Dementia Understand Together in Communities action. The aim of this action is to create access environments so that people with dementia can remain connected and engaged in community if they so wish.

Tipperary County Council is a proud partner of Healthy Ireland framework which is a government led initiative aimed at improving the health and wellbeing of everyone living in Ireland. There are four national goals within the framework:

- Increase the proportion of people who are healthy at all stages of life
- Reduce health inequalities
- Protect the public from threats to health and wellbeing
- Create an environment where every sector of society can play their part

The Tipperary Local Community Development



Committee have developed 'A Strategy for a Healthy Tipperary 2018 – 2020' the aim being to develop interagency actions based on local, county and national priority programmes. This is overseen by the Healthy Tipperary Steering Group which consists of partner organisations across the county and chaired by the HSE.

Activities currently supported by Healthy Tipperary across the county are Traveller Mental Health; Dementia Understand Together; Tipperary Active Bodies; 'Make the Moove: Farmers Matter'; Active Tots in Tipp; Healthy Relationships; Healthy Weaning Workshops; Mind Body and Soul Youth Promotion Programme; Non Violent Resistance and TLC Kidz programme; Social Farming and Tipperary LGBTi Youth Strategic Support Programme. We have a further regional activity with other counties regarding Tobacco Free; Positive Aging and Healthy Food Made Easy. There are several activities ongoing for Community Mental Health in the county.

This complements Tipperary Libraries 'Healthy Ireland at Your Library' programme which includes a special books collection, online health resources and talks, discussions and workshops with a focus on physical health, mental health and health literacy. We have two initiatives that we ran during the year that were very successful.

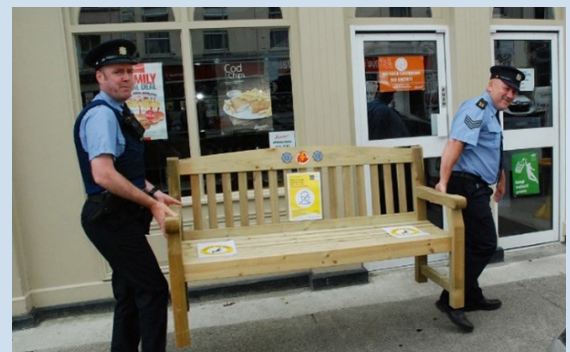
The first one came about following a Government direction in March of this year on a staggered return to school, Roscrea Gardaí implemented an initiative, which targeted those children awaiting their return. The aim was to prevent congregations of children meeting, in an attempt to emphasize the importance of social distancing, whilst promoting mental health and physical wellbeing.

The initiative, which was heavily embraced by the school principals, involved students running one (1) kilometer a day for ten (10) days and furnishing their schools with the times that they completed the task. The schools acting as the intermediary assisted in all GDPR matters. The runs had to be completed on a solo basis and the top students received a prize for their endeavors. The prizes were all donated by local business. The school principals were extremely appreciative of the initiative as it also assisted them in ensuring physical education for the children at home in a time of uncertainty within the school year.

As a lovely addition to this program, Garda Gaynor in Roscrea visited the St Cronan's and St Anne's schools in Roscrea. Over fifty (50) students of the schools participated in the initiative with the assistance of their caregivers. Each participant received a locally donated Easter egg, a medal and a certificate of achievement, which were presented by Superintendent Golden on the 25th March at the respective schools. The children and the members involved enjoyed a special morning with each other.

The second one was The Chatting bench which was kindly donated by Colaiste Phobal, Roscrea. This initiative was launched to provide an opportunity for the various communities to meet with local Gardaí outside of the Garda Station. During the summer months Gardaí reached out to various housing estates in Roscrea throughout the summer playing soccer with the local kids and eating ice creams!!!!

TETBs Community Education groups returned to face-to-face learning in September 2021. Like many, these learners endured a difficult year. The news of their return to classroom-based learning was a relief all round. Two such groups delighted to return were Roscrea wood carving groups, Woodies and Peckers. For 10 weeks, learners worked with their incredibly talented tutor Para, sculpting bespoke pieces unique to each learner. The group spoke of their joy and relief at returning to 'normality' and their determination to keep the class running by adhering to the strict guidelines imposed on all groups. The product of their work can only be described as amazing. Well done to all involved. Community Education in partnership with NTDC successfully ran a craft course with the creative and talented tutor Lorraine during the summer in the garden of the Roscrea Youth Service. The course was aimed at those in our community who found it difficult to access online classes during the past 18 months, for them the first community social connection in a very long time, The group continued over the winter months in the Muintir Ne Tire Hall while adhering to guidelines and staying safe. The group has continued the class under the talented Kathleen and are currently learning the craft of glass painting.





ROSCREA LIBRARY

Roscrea Library is located on the Birr Road, Roscrea. We open 5 days a week, Monday to Friday from 10 am to 1pm and 2pm to 5pm.

At Roscrea Library, we pride ourselves on providing an inclusive service that is accessible by families, students, life long learners, older people and people with disabilities.

Membership of the Library is FREE and your library card can be used in any library across the country. We also have access to books from across the library network in Ireland, so even if that title you want is on the shelf in Donegal, we will do our best to get it to Roscrea Library for you.

While our main focus, naturally, is on books of all types, we do have lots of other facilities available! We have daily and local weekly newspapers available for reading in the library, so there's no excuse for not being up to date! We also have an extensive collection of Local History material.

We also have a public PC available for use, which is

free of charge, and members of the public can also scan, print and photocopy items, for which there is a small charge.

We have a community/exhibition space which has been used by various groups, such as our knitting group, our art group and school and other community groups. This space has also been used by local artists to exhibit their work. While this space is unavailable at present due to Covid restrictions, but we hope that it will be available again in early 2022, subject to Government Guidelines.

For those of you who can't make it to the library, we have an online catalogue which allows members to search, request and renew books and a range of e-services to download at your leisure.

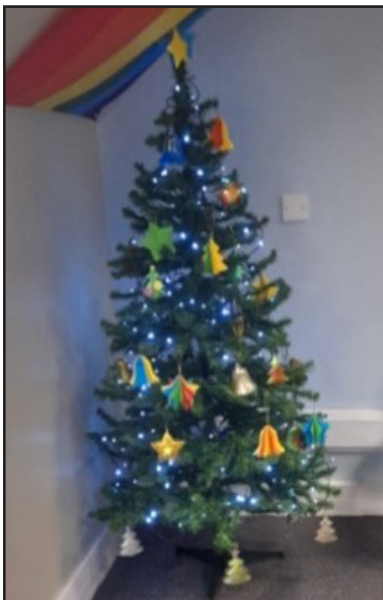


Sports Day in the Park.

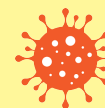
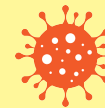


Covid and the volunteers

We have all experienced the hardships brought to us by Covid-19, lockdowns, loss of social interaction, cancelled appointments, illness and for many the loss of friends and loved ones without access to the traditional comforts afforded by an Irish Funeral, but there is much to be positive about to.

Very quickly it became apparent that the State and its agencies and services could not cope with a Pandemic, The National Ambulance Service, staffed by some truly heroic people was overwhelmed with all it had to do, Emergencies, patient transports and covid testing, step forward the volunteers of the Red Cross, Order of Malta, and St. Johns ambulance services, here in North Tipperary they all played a vital role in the Community Call managed by Tipperary County Council and the Tipperary Volunteer Centre, no role too small or large, Patient transfers and transports for appointments, prescription deliveries and Covid testing and vaccination centres, food deliveries and welfare checks.

Age friendly Roscrea and Nationwide organised a phone support system to ensure any who needed a chat or supports were not forgotten, Residents groups and associations organising winter fuel and shopping for the essential's, walking dogs, and chatting at the windows of those whose vulnerability meant they had to self-isolate for months, and let us not forget the young people who called to the elderly to bring in the turf during the summer.



Covid-19 has decimated much of what was once normal and taken for granted but it has also awoken the community spirit in many, young and old, for many the past year has been very difficult and for some the difficulties continue, the numbers of those volunteering may have fallen, mostly due to people returning to work, but the need for volunteers has not fallen, we must encourage and facilitate the development of volunteering in our communities and towns, so much that is good in our Country is because giving selflessly benefits all, at a recent Tipperary PPN (Public Participation Network) a talk given on Positive Psychology by Sona (sona_real_life_positivity on Instagram) highlighted how such positive actions can benefit the individual doing the volunteering as much as the person or persons receiving it.

In Roscrea we have a variety of groups and services, all positive and open to new people, but most of all we have people who would benefit very much from all that volunteering and being active brings, you don't have to join a “Committee” or take on any role you don't want to but just being a part of something can be more rewarding than you imagine, just look at all that has been achieved during the past year.
